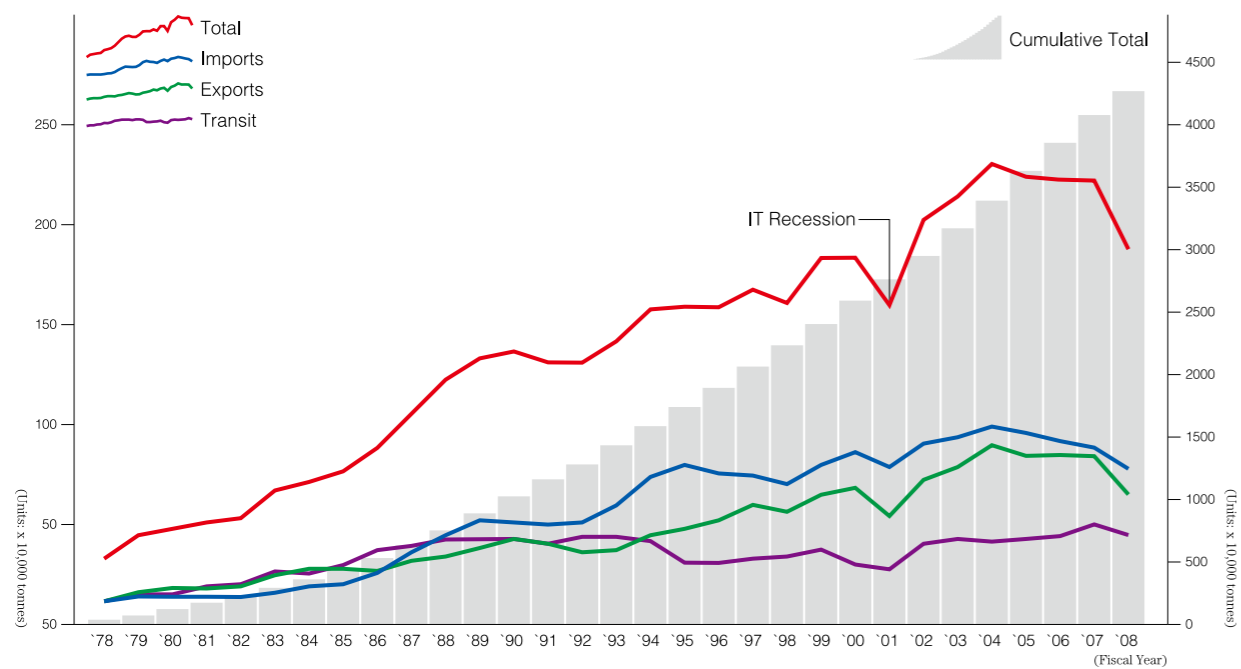


## Cargo Traffic

Approximately 1.88 million tonnes of international air cargo passed through Narita International Airport in fiscal 2008, around 15% less than the previous fiscal year. The decline in air cargo traffic was due to declines in imports and significant falls in exports as a result of the worsening global economic situation since last autumn.

Exports were down 13% to 650,000 tonnes, imports fell 12% to 780,000 tonnes and transit freight decreased 8% to 460,000 tonnes.

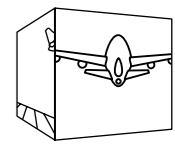
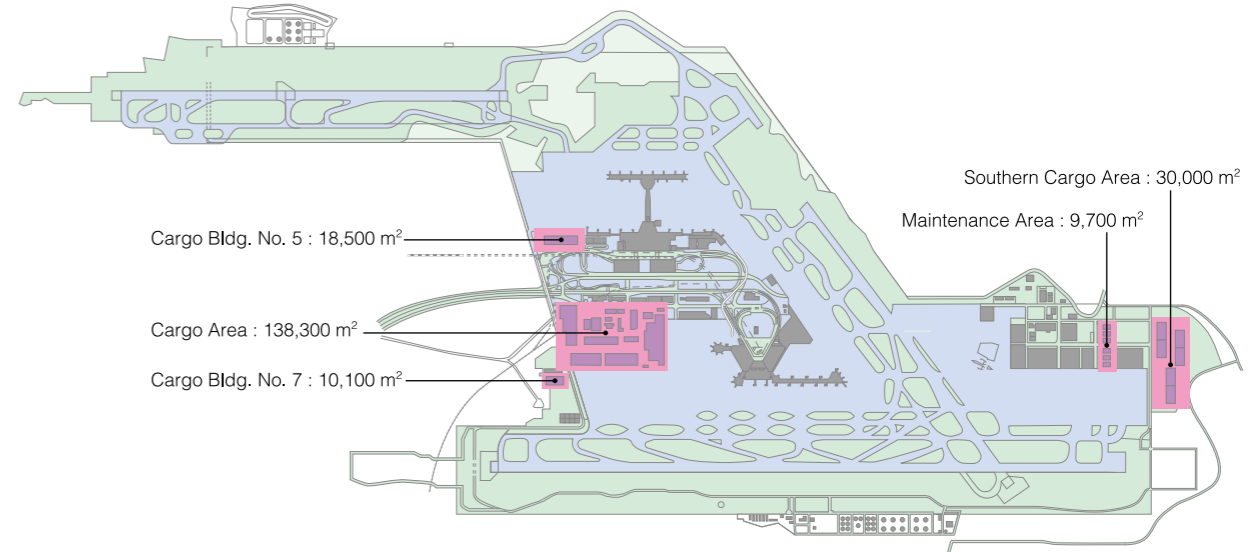


## Logistics Facilities around the Airport

With the increase in international cargo handled at Narita Airport, the functions of the airport are being augmented by a string of construction projects around the airport by freight forwarders building their own cargo facilities and logistic property developers constructing facilities for lease. This was precipitated by the abolition in 1996 of the criteria used to determine

where cargo was cleared through Customs. Prior to this, only some perishables could be cleared at Narita International Airport but with the abolition, this restriction was lifted across the board and also made it possible to obtain permits for bonded warehouses. As of 1 Jun 2009, freight forwarder warehouses around the airport offered floor space exceeding 400,000m<sup>2</sup>, far surpassing the 200,000m<sup>2</sup> available in the airport.

### Growing Number of Forwarder Facilities around Narita

In the area surrounding the airport, there have been a string of forwarders and logistics estate development companies constructing cargo facilities over the last few years. Forty-three companies have established facilities in 47 locations to serve as off-airport bonded storage areas. These warehouses offer more than 400,000 sq. m. in floor space and, bearing in mind that the available area within the airport is around 200,000 sq. m., they ease the congestion resulting from the confined on-airport space.
